

GARY'S TAKE

Dear Friend,

Over several years, Open Doors has conducted research which shows that Christian women and girls are doubly vulnerable to persecution. Women are targeted because of their gender and because of their faith. Genderspecific persecution is widely used to repress the Christian community because it often goes unnoticed and is a low risk to perpetrators. The persecution targeted at men is more easily recorded and monitored but persecution against women and girls is hidden, complex and violent.

In this issue you will read the story of Simin from Iran. As in her story, persecution against Christian women often takes place quietly within a family, conducted by the very people a woman would turn to for love and trust. Imagine having your name erased from all family records by your own father because you chose to follow Jesus.

Open Doors' vision is that every woman persecuted for her faith and gender is seen, valued and empowered. Open Doors partners deliver projects around the world that meet the specific needs of persecuted Christian women. Whether that means humanitarian relief for Iraqi refugees, trauma care in Nigeria or political advocacy in India, each project aims to restore the hope, dignity and identity of vulnerable Christian women.

However, to ensure that this issue is adequately responded to, we must all do our part. As Christians living in Canada, we can pray for our sisters who live in areas where they are vulnerable to attack. We can give them a voice by speaking out about their plight with people in power. We can also support the many Open Doors projects that deliver help and aid to ensure they don't feel abandoned by the global Church. How will you respond today?

Women are already vulnerable in the Middle East – but Christian women are made to feel worthless. You can help a woman know her value in Christ.

Anger blazed in her father's eyes as he flipped over the kitchen table and roared at Sara*. "All this time you asked about Christianity, I thought it would pass. But apparently I did not raise you right!"

He snatched Sara's phone and locked her in her bedroom. Sara remained there, trapped, for 10 whole days. Later, she discovered her father had erased her name from the family records.

It was a brutal, ruthless rejection

– all because this young woman
had turned her back on Islam and
chosen Jesus instead.

For months, Sara, who lived in Iraq, had been reading a Bible given to her by a Christian friend. The loving God she discovered in Scripture couldn't be more different from the God of Islam she'd been raised to fear. "After I found Christ, my life transformed completely," said Sara.

But now, spurned by the family she loved, Sara felt worthless. She's not the only one.

UNDER ATTACK

Across the Middle East, women are vulnerable. They have fewer rights than men and limited opportunities. But if a woman is also a disciple of Christ, her vulnerability is exploited and she becomes the target for intense persecution.

While men tend to face violent, physical and public attacks for their faith, the persecution of women is insidious and cruel. According to Open Doors' latest report on Gender-Specific Religious Persecution, the value of Christian women is under attack.

"IN THE BIBLE, WOMEN HAVE SO MUCH VALUE. WE ARE SEEN!"

Women are shamed by sexual violence, devalued by forced marriage, and stripped of their identity by the loss of work and independence. Often, their suffering is hidden because persecution happens behind closed doors.

SIMIN'S STORY

Simin*, from Iran, was a young nurse when she opened a Bible for the first time – and God touched her heart.

"In the Bible, women have so much value. We are seen!" she

exclaimed. "I felt I was walking with Jesus, and it changed me."

But faith cost Simin dearly. Her family mocked her. Her father said she'd lost her mind. "Islam and the regime in Iran destroyed the identity of women and almost all women are broken," she said. One day, Simin's home was raided by police – and her sense of worth was stripped away.

"My husband and I were in prison for 18 days. Just a few hours after we were found guilty, the hospital called to say I was fired," said Simin. "We realized the only way to survive and keep serving Jesus was to flee Iran. It was terrifying, but we had to sacrifice."

GOD-GIVEN POTENTIAL

No woman should be made to feel worthless. Women like Sara and Simin need to know their value in Christ. They need your help to fulfil their God-given potential.

Your gifts and prayers this Easter can provide persecuted women with desperately needed leadership and discipleship training, trauma care and pastoral support. At Centres of Hope across the Middle East, you can help women grow in faith, start their own businesses, and support one another.

For Sara, rejected by loved ones, the care of her global church family



means the world. She escaped her father and now attends a Centre of Hope church in northern Iraq. Her dream is to get an identity card which states her Christian faith.

"GOD BROUGHT ME TO MY LOWEST, ONLY TO LIFT ME UP AGAIN."

"I've never regretted the decision I made," said Sara. "God brought me down to my lowest, only to lift me up again."

And for Simin, who lost her home, job and freedom, your support strengthens her to serve other women. "I'm getting better, mentally and spiritually. I'm not there yet, but I understand the pain of other women and I want to comfort them."

Two different stories. Two women made to feel worthless by persecution. But one powerful church family, which can lift up persecuted women so they know their value in Christ.

Seven years of gender-specific religious persecution (GSRP) research findings have confirmed a clear pattern, that whether male or female, young or old, religious persecution is rarely experienced as a single, isolated Pressure Point. For **men and boys**, GSRP is focused, visible and severe. It is marked by targeted physical violence, including lethal violence, as well as by state and economic pressures. For **women and girls**, it is complex, hidden and violent. It is characterized by sexual violence and forced marriage, as well as by insidious, invisible violence behind closed doors.



Ani's eyes fill with tears as she remembers the terrifying explosion that rocked her world.

"I was holding my baby Maria in my lap, and in a matter of seconds I saw myself flying and Maria crying. We fell and I saw Maria had a huge wound on her head. I have no recollection after that."

It was 2014, several years into Svria's civil war, and recentlymarried Ani and Sarkis were doing their best to survive in their hometown of Aleppo. As a Christian family, they were at extreme risk from groups like ISIS. The bomb blast left seven-monthold Maria fighting for her life.

"Doctors removed mortar fragments from Maria's head, but one shard remained," said Ani. "It was too risky to remove the last piece of shell from her brain."

Thankfully, Maria pulled through, but needs ongoing medical care. Ani turned to Jesus in a way she never had before. And you were there to love and support your sister in Christ.

Ani started attending a Centre of Hope church, where you provided practical and spiritual through Open Doors' partners. "Whenever we prayed, I would hear at Maria's next hospital appointment that the bones had started to heal without the need for further surgery," said Ani.

Ani joined a Bible group. "I found peace and safety," she smiled, "I've never felt this way before." When Ani became pregnant again, your support helped renovate the family's new home. And after baby Eliza had arrived, your gifts empowered Ani to start a small business by providing her with sewing machines.

Now, a decade on from the bomb that changed their lives, Ani and Sarkis – and their daughters Maria and Eliza – are full of faith and courage. Life is still hard, and many Christians are leaving Syria because of persecution, but this family has chosen to remain.

"When I come to our church, I feel as if I am home," said Ani. "I can face life's challenges with a sense of peace because I know the Lord is with me. I love my country, and because of my business I can stay here and provide for my family."

She added, "I hope one day Maria will tell others how Jesus worked in her life. I hope she and Eliza will be servants of the Lord. Your support has been vital to me. You helped me through so much and made my life easier."



FINDING HER VALUE



When Iraqi believer, Sara, was rejected by her family, she felt worthless. Thanks to you, she's discovering her value in Christ.

The door slammed shut and Sara's* father turned the key. She was locked in her bedroom...

For 10 days, Sara remained in that room with nothing to eat, while her father simmered with rage at her new-found faith in Jesus, "I would have preferred if you ran away with

a man to get married, and not done this," he told Sara.

IRAQ

It's hard to believe this bright young woman, a medical student in Baghdad, Iraq, could be made to feel so worthless. Sara loved her father, and the rejection was deeply painful. But she did not give up on Jesus. "I felt lonely and hopeless, but I kept my faith and kept praying to God."

Miraculously, Sara escaped and fled north. However, as an unmarried woman and a convert, she was extremely vulnerable. Her father had erased her name from the family records, and she was continually harassed by men.

But God guided Sara into a Centre of Hope – and towards your faithful support.

Sara turned away from the hurt and shame caused by loved ones, and stepped into the arms of her global church family. There, thanks to you, Sara is valued, empowered and strengthened in her faith.

"Before, my life was empty," said Sara. "I didn't have the joy and peace that I have now in my heart. Now, I am grateful for all the bad things I've been through because I know God better and I was transformed into His image."

Today, Sara attends a church which is an Open Doors' Centre of Hope. There are more than 100 Centres of Hope in Iraq, and more across the Middle East. Your generosity means these centres shine as beacons of light, providing persecuted believers with spiritual, practical and emotional help.

With your gifts and prayers, Centres of Hope run Bible studies and distribute Scripture, provide health and medical aid, and run income-generating projects, education and trauma healing.

With growing restrictions in China, it is important for the Chinese church to be trained in how to stand strong amidst the storm.

Open Doors partners in China were able to begin 2024 with a successful persecution training program for local Christians called SSTS: Standing Strong Through the Storm. The three-day event was surrounded by prayer, but also significant apprehension. A previous program had almost been discovered, but this event went through without a problem. Local church leaders were encouraged, and one partner says joyfully "The Lord is in control! He is the God who makes all things work together for good. May everyone involved in this event be strengthened even more after experiencing God's help!"
