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GARY'S TAKE

Hardly a day goes by when we don't hear another story about the extreme surveillance being forced on Chinese citizens by their own government. Whether it is human rights lawyers being stripped of their licences, or everyday citizens being monitored through the Chinese social credit system, no one can escape the watchful eye of the ruling Chinese communist party. Now, church leaders are concerned about the impact of a new measure in China – an online database recording all registered church leaders, offering information to people willing to give their phone number.


House churches, or any church group outside the tightly controlled and monitored Three Self Church, already face increasing oppression from the Chinese authorities. China is number 16 on the Open Doors World Watch List and has moved swiftly up the list in recent years. Due to increasing surveillance and restrictions, many house churches ceased meeting in larger groups and have split into smaller groups. Others used to meet online, but this has become more difficult as Chinese authorities pay closer attention to online activities.

This increasing surveillance along with added restrictions are extremely concerning, especially to Christians who courageously live out their faith in a place hostile towards it. My faith is challenged as I see them take bold steps to continue to shine the light of Christ and to share the Gospel despite the risks to their own safety and the safety of their families. Our brothers and sisters in China need our prayers more than ever.

Please join me in praying, that as digital surveillance and persecution worsen, these family members will be able to continue worshipping God and sharing His gospel.

Glancing up and down the dark alley, Ming* quickly loads heavy boxes into his car. If caught, he would likely be arrested and sent to prison.

Ming pulls out his phone and messages his contact. "I'm on my way to the old place." It's code... the message won't only be seen by Ming's friend, so it's vital to be cautious. Then Ming turns off his phone and pulls out the SIM card. After all, he doesn't want his location tracked.

The car eases out onto a quiet, moonlit street. No one is around at this time of night. But as Ming drives away, the street's surveillance cameras twitch and turn. Someone is watching...

INTENSE MONITORING

There are a billion surveillance cameras in the world. Half of them are in China. And the authorities are using this ever-more sophisticated technology to keep eyes on the unregistered, underground church.

Facial recognition and artificial intelligence are dangerous tools in the hands of authoritarian regimes. Believers have had social media accounts blocked and bank accounts frozen. You can't buy a Bible online in China anymore. So Christians must take increasingly bigger risks to meet believers and share God's word.

And with China beginning to export surveillance systems to countries like Iran, India and Myanmar, could technology become a new tool of persecution?

MING'S STORY

But what was Ming doing that night? Why was he so cautious? The answer: his car was loaded with Bibles destined for rural ethnic minority people...

Ming was passionate about serving the ethnic community he grew up in. After returning to his hometown from the city, Ming met believers in little-known places and led secret Bible study groups. He launched a business as a cover for Bible distribution.

But it all came crashing down when the business was exposed and Ming's partners were jailed. Miraculously Ming was released after his arrest. It was a narrow escape – but the Bible smuggling cover was gone and the heightened surveillance which followed was oppressive.

"I knew it would be hard to dodge the police and I'd have to live even more cautiously. There may be spies sneaking into the Christian community, so I needed to stay vigilant," said Ming. "I had no one to trust. I felt insecure and isolated." The threat reached a new level when the authorities started randomly searching his home. Ming took the hard decision to send his wife and daughter to live with his in-laws to protect them. But this sacrifice was used against Ming when his father-in-law refused to let the family see each other. It only added to Ming's misery and suffering.

Under such intense scrutiny, it would be easy for Ming to give up smuggling Bibles and meeting Christians. His faith in Jesus might be shaken. What would happen then to believers who depended on Ming for spiritual support?

WATCH AND PRAY

That's where you come in. You can watch over your brothers and sisters under surveillance, in China and elsewhere, by giving and praying.

You can help prepare Christians for the dangers of digital monitoring and provide Bibles and discipleship training to persecuted believers. With your support and encouragement, Christians like Ming will remain resilient, courageous witnesses for Jesus.

Thanks to people like you, Open Doors' partner Brother Hao Ran* came alongside Ming. They meet regularly to pray and read the Bible. Slowly, Ming's strength returned – and he learnt to trust again.

Now, despite the risk to his own life and freedom, Ming keeps sharing God's word. "No matter what happens I know it is predestined by our Heavenly Father," he said. "We listen and follow. He will guide our path."

PLEASE PRAY

For Ming, that God will fill him with resilience and courage as a witness for Jesus.

Christians in Pakistan are asking for urgent prayer after a mob of Muslim extremists have attacked a Christian community and burned down several churches and homes.

The mob violence took places in the Jaranwala city in the Faisalabad district of Punjab province after two Christians were accused of blasphemy.

Hundreds of men then stormed the community, attacking churches, setting homes on fire and even destroying a cemetery. Early media and human rights groups estimates say that at least 8 churches were burned—along with multiple homes and Bibles—and 17 churches were targeted. Christians in the community were forced to run for their lives.

In addition to global prayer, Open Doors is calling on the international community to speak out about the dangerous situation for Christians in Pakistan. "No one should live life in fear of an unruly mob that comes to destroy and kill," says Open Doors' global advocacy team. "We call on the international community to work with the government of Pakistan to build concrete plans to address the mob mentality brutally demonstrated against Christians in Pakistan."



Pray for the people in the Christian community who are left to rebuild their homes and churches. Ask that God will bind up their wounds and give them comfort.

Pray for Pakistani Christians, who live under the injustice of Pakistan's blasphemy laws and now witness yet another violent incident caused by a mere accusation.

ADDITIONAL PRAYER REQUESTS:

IRAN: There are further crackdowns on civil liberties in Iran as the anniversary of protests and unrests draws closer.

The number of Christians being arrested in Iran continues to rise. Most are being released, but are also being forced to sign commitments to refrain from further Christian activities. Some have even been ordered to leave the country, while one believer was fired from his job because of his faith. Please keep praying for all the Christians who have been arrested, and for their families. In recent months, there have been several instances of released prisoners being rearrested on vague charges.


Article18, an organization dedicated to the protection and promotion of religious freedom in Iran, confirms that 69 Christians were arrested during a seven-week period in June and July. At this time, at least 10 of those arrested are still in detention.

INDIA: Lucy Marem (57), a Christian woman from the Naga tribe was shot dead in Imphal east Manipur by Hindu extremists on July 15. A video of her brutal killing was recorded and was recently circulated on social media. Marem, who had mental health issues, went missing from home – later her body was found on the streets, almost unrecognizable.

"It is appalling to see such brutality against the Christians and our hearts cry out for the victims and their families. I appeal to the global church to pray and intercede for Manipur, for peace and harmony in the state." says Open Doors' local partner in India, Priya Sharma.





It was a chilling moment, the first time Ko Aung* realized he was being watched by the authorities.

This young believer had been working as an Open Doors' partner in Myanmar, delivering rice, oil, Bibles and hymn books to believers in remote villages. He had encountered persecution,

of course, but felt positive and upbeat.

Then in 2021, Myanmar's military leaders overthrew the democratically-elected ruling party in a dramatic coup. When Ko Aung next logged onto his online banking app... "It was blocked," he said. "A month later, another

mobile banking app was blocked. I couldn't take any money out."

Ko Aung was shocked. He tried to open a new account, but learned he'd been red-flagged by the authorities. It turned out the military had been watching him visiting ethnic minority communities (where he delivered aid to Christians) – and believed Ko Aung was a member of an enemy militia.

This label immediately put Ko Aung in grave danger. "There was a high possibility I could be monitored and arrested on false charges," he said. "There have been many instances of this. Some people even die behind bars."

And the fear began to take its toll... "I couldn't sleep, I woke up frightened every time a car passed. My health was deteriorating day by day. I lost weight, I lost my hair. When the militia came near our village, I hid in the jungle."

It became clear: Ko Aung could no longer stay in Myanmar. Thanks to you, he could escape.

When Ko Aung was under intense surveillance, you were also watching over him. With your support, Open Doors partners helped Ko Aung flee his homeland and make a life in a new country.

He still must be careful. He doesn't put traceable information on

social media, for example, and he's cautious about which family members he contacts in case the military are listening into phone calls. But he's grateful for your gifts and prayers.

"I want to thank you for the help you've given me and the prayers that have been prayed for me," said Ko Aung. "At first, it was hard for me to forgive my persecutors. But now I can forgive them. Once the coup has ended, I want to go back to my home and continue to support ethnic Christians."

For Rukayyatu, the biggest loss was her Bible, because it kept her away from the Word of God, "which is the source of my hope and strength". Now, an Open Doors relief package that arrived for IDPs in Cameroon provided Rukayyatu with a brand new Bible. "The past year without a Bible has been empty, now I am filled," she says.
